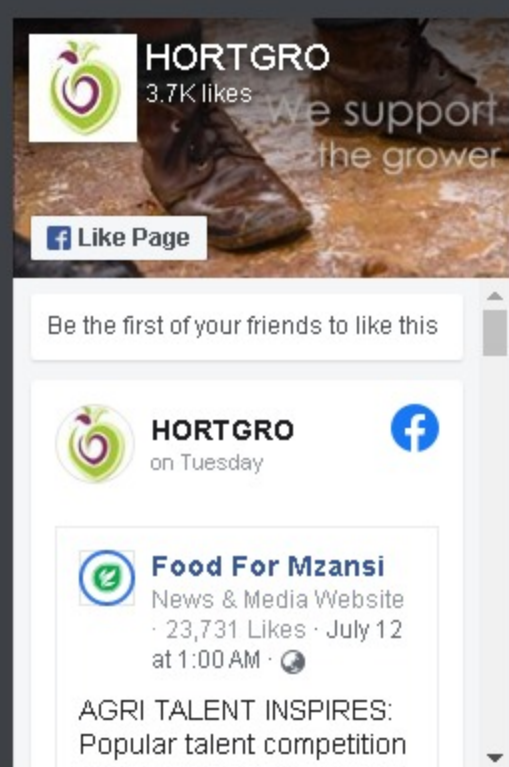
HORTGRO INVESTS R3,7M IN STUDENTS

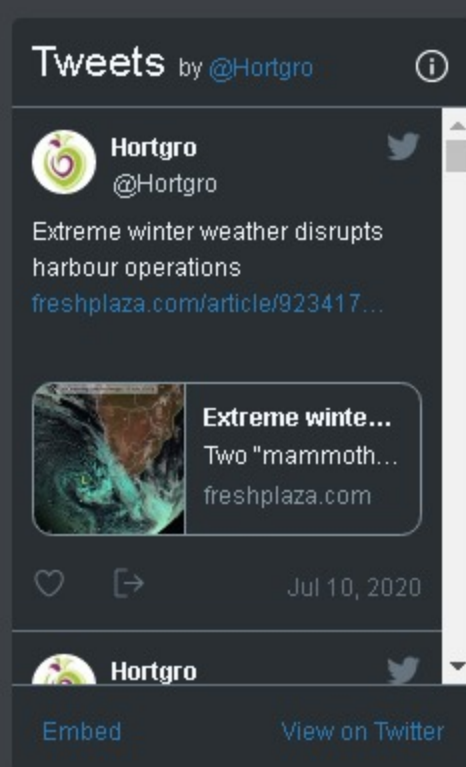

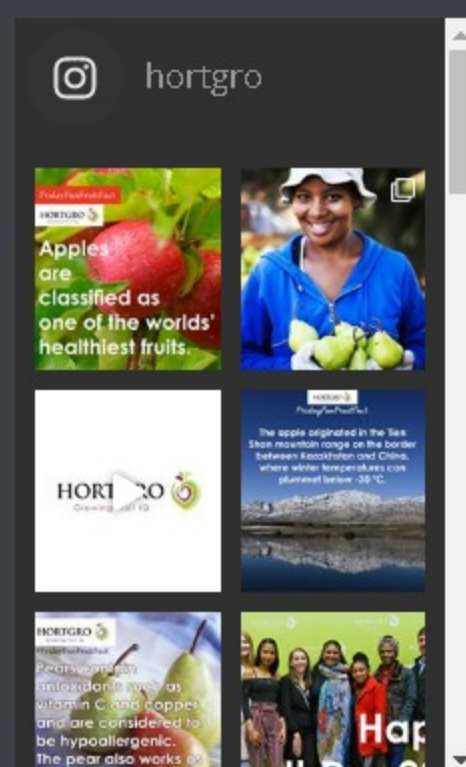
